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

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Women in #WW2 beyond pin-up roles are focus of @OxfordYasmin research interest - how do they experience war? Sex work & prostitution are among the best documented experiences of women in colonised societies, accessible via British military archives. #hiddenww2

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Women in colonial India not affected by bombing, but still found themselves on the imperial home front in #WW2, argues @OxfordYasmin. #hiddenww2





Keynote by @OxfordYasmin explores women's experiences on the colonial home front experiences via case studies of several women, often illiterate & reliant on others to write letters & petitions for them. #hiddenww2





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Problematising idea of the colonial 'volunteer' via the resistance of Indian mothers - from 1943 Empire awarded medals to imperial mothers with multiple sons serving, notes @OxfordYasmin Attempt to placate resistance? #hiddenww2

#HiddenWW2 @OxfordYasmin first keynote emphasises role of mothers in colonial recruitment. Mobilisation home front to enable/support mil effort. Strains of wartime separations



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Case of Nazir Begum outlined by @OxfordYasmin: Indian soldier's wife in #WW2, felt to be a burden on her family in her husband's absence as there is no remittance for her - writes to army to complain & threaten divorce if help isn't given. #hiddenww2

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Wartime reversals to 1930s labour laws in India: women again drafted in for underground work in mines, sometimes far into pregnancy - made illegal before #WW2, now made possible again by wartime pressures, outlines @OxfordYasmin #hiddenww2





As men are drawn into the army in India & East Africa, women are drawn into hard industrial and agricultural labour - not just a European phenomenon, and working hours and conditions often back-breaking and literally killing, points out @OxfordYasmin #hiddenww2

Red light district well known attraction of wartime Cairo in early stages of war. #hiddenww2

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Women weren't just passive, notes @OxfordYasmin: negotiators, speaking up for themselves, e.g. letter by African sex workers complaining about favouritism in the way British army gives preferential treatment to some brothels over others. #hiddenww2





Imperial women also working for war effort in uniform, esp. middle-class women in Dominions, but also e.g. in India: 11,500 women in the Women's Auxiliary Corps (India), says @OxfordYasmin - often Anglo-Indian or Indian Christian. #hiddenww2

If sexual Labour was a key sure for women and men to meet across the empire during #ww2, how did this shape experiences, identities, histories? @OxfordYasmin #hiddenWW2



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English female nurses acting as whistleblowers on stark differences between military hospitals for non-white colonial as opposed to white British soldiers during #WW2, explains @OxfordYasmin #hiddenww2



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Keynote closes with thinking about Indian women who become involved with National Congress during #WW2; @OxfordYasmin speaks about Aruna Asaf Ali as one prominent example. #hiddenww2 Learn more about her here: en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Aruna_Asa...



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Returning to the idealised 'Together' recruitment poster, @OxfordYasmin argues #WW2 deepened authoritarianism & hierarchies of race & gender. Alongside celebrating colonial (women's) contributions, these negative effects also have to be borne in mind. #hiddenww2





Women's and gender history can be a means of bringing imperial and war histories into conversation with one another @OxfordYasmin #hiddenWW2

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Prompted by question from @LucyNoakes1, @OxfordYasmin observes that women's #WW2 experiences around the world are not secondary to men's just because women tended to be noncombatants. #hiddenww2



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Question by @tgplawson prompts clarification by @OxfordYasmin that backbreaking labour by British colonial subjects isn't entirely comparable to forced labour in Nazi Germany as it is paid, though the effects might have been as bad for some people. #hiddenww2





Question of sources: testimonials of imperial women, esp. lower class, are sadly far & few between, but here & there included in older studies, letters in military archives, etc. - some eyewitnesses also still survive: still space for oral history, says @OxfordYasmin #hiddenww2





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First panel, chaired by @jonathanfennell: Marginalised experiences in the British Army, with Roy Marom (Haifa), @wugolini (Edinburgh) and Ghee @GheeBowman (Edinburgh) #hiddenWW2



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Starting us up is Roy Marom (Haifa), who opens his paper on Jewish and Arab workers in British Army Camps in Palestine during #WW2 by observing the marginalisation of these workers in Israeli cultural memory. #hiddenWW2

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Roy Marom points to sources that allow insight into lives of Jewish and Arab workers in British #WW2 army camps - diaries, official documents relating to camps such as RAF Ein Shemer in Palestine. #hiddenWW2





Roy Marom on camp work historiography: some Israeli and Arab scholarship on this, e.g. on effect of camps on Jewish settlements; little use of Arab sources, narrative or otherwise; preponderance of administrative records, intelligence reports. #hiddenWW2

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Marom: camp workers, Jewish or Arab, not entitled to sick leave or similar compensations. #hiddenWW2





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Marom on 'Ba-Kemp': journal of the army camp workers in the environs of Tel Aviv in #WW2, and on attempts to organise workers and secure them recognition. #hiddenWW2





Marom moves on to discussion of the different perceptions of people present in the Army Camps during #WW2 among Jewish and Arab workers respectively. Both groups note British condescension. #hiddenWW2 pic.twitter.com/kiBUwvfY1S



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Marom on encounters between Arab workers and British Army women during #WW2 documented in written sources - army camps enable interactions hitherto unheard of. Also notes instances of romantic involvement between British personnel and Jewish women. #hiddenWW2



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Marom notes that camp work was often seen as formative experience by camp workers - points to Arab camp workers' testimonials and unheard life stories, preserved in oral records. #hiddenWW2



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Next up: @wugolini on the British Italian experience in the armed forces during #WW2 #hiddenww2

@wugolini need to embed history of #ww2 into wider histories of 'race', identity and empire #hiddenWW2



A DAY AGO



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Clearly a need to integrate study of war within a more multi-racial framework, which to @wugolini includes different white ethnicities. Her work (and paper) centres on 35,000 British Italian immigrants, of which 15,000 children whose fathers would be called up. #hiddenww2



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Dual nationality and problematic allegiances of British Italians during #WW2 noted by @wugolini - might end up fighting family. Initial policy to exempt British Italians from service in Italy, but eroded as war progresses. #hiddenww2





The 'Italianness' of British Italians such as Paratrooper Italo Grumoli utilised in different military contexts. Other British Italians resort to conscientious objection, or renounce British citizenship, notes @wugolini. #hiddenww2





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Hard to find British Italian servicemen, who aren't listed separately, says @wugolini - based on painstaking research on rolls of honour, estimates a conservative 7,000 in the army, not including RAF. Around 4,000 British Italian men interned during #WW2. #hiddenww2

Cases such as that of Renzo Serafini discussed by @wugolini to illustrate the problem of torn loyalties, but also anti-Italian sentiments among British, including fierce anti-Italian sentiments in army. #hiddenWW2 pic.twitter.com/66WXEo8zEr



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Policy of protection: @wugolini notes the racialised tone of debates on the treatment of dual British Italian nationals. #hiddenWW2





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Racist micro-aggressions against British Italian servicement? @wugolini recounts one veterans' recollection of superior's deliberate mispronouncing of his name at roll call every single morning. #hiddenWW2



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Delegates now listening to fascinating recording of oral testimony by Angelo Valente, RAMC veteran born in 1914, describing his experience in wartime Italy, asserting the Italian aspect of his identity whilst tucking into a traditional British Christmas dinner. #hiddenWW2



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Veteran testimonials show that negative reception and stereotyping could co-exist with a more positive experience of dual/hybrid British-Italian identity, closes @wugolini. #hiddenWW2

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
Some interesting threads emerging already after only first keynote and panel at #hiddenww2 workshop: importance of oral history; hierarchies of memory and remembrance; need to embed multinational stories in memory of Britain and #WW2; questions of who/what is marginal?





Moving on to @GheeBowman and the experience of Indians at Dunkirk - argues that Dunkirk is a prime example of both excess of memory and excess of forgetting (of the Indian soldiers present). #hiddenWW2





Key quote for today's reflections on #hiddenWW2 opens @GheeBowman paper on Indians at Dunkirk pic.twitter.com/MauDP8qaz7



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Major Mohammad Akhbar Khan led his men four miles along the beach at Dunkirk - his and other Indian Dunkirk veterans' experiences focus of @GheeBowman's paper. #hiddenWW2



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'Each unit resembled an all-male Punjabi village, transplanted to France': @GheeBowman on Royal Indian Army Service Corps. #hiddenww2





Captain John Ashdown, second in command of 32nd Company of Royal Indian Army Service Corps claimed he was ordered to abandon not only the mules, but his men - refused and was court martialled, says @GheeBowman. #hiddenww2

Likely that 32nd Company were in fact given order that it was every man for himself, as reported by Major Akhbar Khan, observes @GheeBowman - Khan refuses, marches men to Dunkirk mole, and manages to get men evacuated without loss. #hiddenWW2



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Collective memory of K6 Royal Indian Army Service Corps submerged, though remarkable story, notes @GheeBowman. #hiddenww2

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Legacy of #WW2 service in Pakistan patchy, despite some commemorative activities, memorials subordinate to commemoration of Lahore resolution, says @GheeBowman. Hardly any attempts to interview veterans and their families. Result of national priorities. #hiddenWW2



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Excess of memory of #WW2 in Britain (and elsewhere in the Western world) contrasted with excess of forgetting in countries like Pakistan - national priorities intervene. #hiddenww2





Why do we forget? @GheeBowman cites Aleida Assman on seven forms of forgetting, esp. selective forgetting/the power of framing: we 'forget' what lies outside our national/cultural framework. #hiddenww2

Thanks to excellent timekeeping, we now have plenty of time for discussion at the end of panel 1 -@jonathanfennell is offering us a quick summation first, drawing out parallels between the 3 papers and noting that all binary narratives of war are problematic. #hiddenWW2 pic.twitter.com/m1ax7WT57i



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Prompted by question, @wugolini notes the reluctance of British Italian veterans to talk about their experiences, which were often characterised by racist prejudice and being perceived as 'not quite white' - took 5 years to interview 45 people. #hiddenWW2





#oralhistory used to great effect to reveal the ways that national identity influenced ww2 participation and how national and racial identity influence the way that participation is remembered. #hiddenww2





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Question from @LucyNoakes1 for @GheeBowman: how can we draw on community initiatives to benefit research into marginal experience of #WW2? Are there lessons to be learned from #WW1 centenary? #hiddenWW2



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Roy Marom, @wugolini & @GheeBowman respond to question from @LucyNoakes1, outlining community initiatives and awareness on their respective subjects. Marom's experience speaking to nursing home residents about camp work positive; stories, letters, etc. preserved. #hiddenww2

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Q for @GheeBowman: how much did objects feature in interviews with people in Pakistani villages? Some few did have objects preserved (photographs, shoes, etc.) mostly by elite veterans/families - villagers tend to have only vague memories/knowledge of service history. #hiddenww2

@wugolini delivering really interesting #oralhistory research findings about the experiences of British Italians, at least 7000 of whom negotiated their dual identity in British forces in WW2 #hiddenww2





Roy Marom notes his experience that one of his interviewees in the West Bank knew more about their grandfather's service in Ottoman Army during #WW1 than their father's experiences during #WW2. Key to building story is listening to all stories: people keen to share. #hiddenww2





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At close of discussion after panel 1, @jonathanfennell causes slight burst of chuckles with question of what twenty-year-old men think of (in response to discussion of ways of accessing stories and sources, one should add). #hiddenWW2 #historianswithsenseofhumour



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After a brief comfort break, we'll shortly start panel 2 on marginalised experiences beyond Britain, chaired by Prof Denis Showalter, featuring papers by Oliver Coates (Cambridge), Carl Bradley (Massey) and Jean P. Smith (KCL). #hiddenWW2

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The first paper of panel 2 is Oliver Coates's talk on West African troop rebellions in South Asia, 1944-1947. #hiddenWW2

Coates: thousands of West Africans stationed in South Asia during #WW2, including labour corps. Traditionally little contact between West Africans and South Asians, so #WW2 establishes unique point of contact. #hiddenWW2





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Coates's focus is on mutineers. West Africans weren't allowed/able to go home on leave, but could go to special leave and rest camps. Held in rest camps after end of war awaiting return home because of lack of shipping. #hiddenWW2

Coates: some direct contact between West African troops and local villagers, and some limited travel opportunities, documented in news items and photos, such as this one of West African soldiers posing in front of the Taj Mahal. #hiddenww2 pic.twitter.com/9RWUCMX0b6



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Coates on denial of haircutting allowance for West African soldiers (as opposed to British and Indian troops) as cause for rebellion - seemingly small issue is tip of iceberg of grievances about way West African troops are treated. #hiddenWW2

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Coates suggests that West African mutineers were able to channel some of the language used by Indian nationalists in their protests. #hiddenWW2



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Coates draws distinction between more formal mutinies by African colonial soldiers elsewhere in the French and British empires, and the more 'informal' West African rebellion in South Asia during #WW2. #hiddenww2



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From West African soldiers in South Asia to Carl Bradley's paper on Maori service in #WW2, focusing on 'Dominant Narratives and Silent Actors'. #hiddenWW2



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Bradley notes that many more Maori served in #WW2 army beyond the relatively well studied 28th Maori Battalion. Doesn't wish to neglect men who served in this battalion, but also wants to look beyond the 20% of Maori who served in it. #hiddenWW2







Bradley begins by thinking about the larger context of the militarisation of indigenous populations during #WW2. #hiddenWW2 pic.twitter.com/zyvoHZ1LTs

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Bradley notes that Maori serving in army during different wars often did so following and promoting their own agendas - served voluntarily. #hiddenWW2

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Bradley: #WW2 28th Maori Battalion made up of distinct tribal groups, split into separate companies. Combat unit accommodating 3,600 of the 17,744 Maori who served. Narrative of duty, obligation and citizenship. #hiddenWW2





Bradley: #WW2 is first time that Maori fought away from New Zealand since #WW1 - felt by many to be preferable to awaiting enemy at home. #hiddenww2

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Bradley also notes the work of Maori women on the #WW2 NZ home front - more work remains to be done, taking cue from work like @OxfordYasmin's on the Indian context. #hiddenww2

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Bradley: Maori history incl. #WW2 contributions kept alive by Maori community: not marginal as far as Maori are concerned! Rich culture of commemoration and preserving history in various forms, differing means and stories depending on tribes. #hiddenww2



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Bradley: must consider Maori history from Maori perspective, not make assumptions about marginalisation - marginal only in Western/non-Maori eyes. Desirable to fund Maori students and researchers to undertake scholarly work on these well-preserved histories. #hiddenWW2





Our next paper is Jean P. Smith's 'The Disappearing Dominion: South Africa in the Second World War', drawing on her work on the South African home front and servicemen's experience of wartime SA. #hiddenWW2





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Jean P. Smith: how does South Africa feature in popular memory of #WW2? Selective focus on generals, 'lady in white', etc. in memoirs. #hiddenWW2



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Jean P. Smith: marginal position of South Africa in research and memory of #WW2 possibly linked to relatively limited military contribution (no conscription), but also connected to post-war condemnation of Apartheid elsewhere in world. #hiddenww2

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Catriona Pennell queries parallels between dog 'Just Nuisance' and the British 'War Horse' phenomenon - Jean P. Smith would like to find out more about ways in which 'Just Nuisance' might feature in South African educational context. #hiddenWW2



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Panel 2 discussion closes with reflections on the 'usability' (Tim Cook) of marginal narratives - how can marginalisation be linked to the purpose of particular stories within larger national / cultural narratives. Differs depending on the groups concerned. #hiddenWW2



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#hiddenWW2 @LucyNoakes1 is going to talk about the marginality of death in history of #WW2 particularly in comparison to history of #WW1 and commemorative events around centenary





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#hiddenWW2 @LucyNoakes1 willingness of cultural historians of #WW1 to engage with issues of emotion, gender, experiences of home, histories of the everyday. Need to see this replicated in historiography of #WW2





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#hiddenWW2 @LucyNoakes1 importance of @MassObsArchive as a source base to uncover ordinary experiences in extraordinary times of global conflict

@LucyNoakes1 discusses how memories of the FWW enacted upon British families as they approached the Second World War #hiddenWW2 @teachlearnwar



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#hiddenWW2 @LucyNoakes1 continuities between burial and remembrance of dead in #WW1 and planning for the dead of the second conflict #WW2 although often worked better in rooms of Whitehall than in practice e.g. in deserts of Middle East



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#hiddenWW2 @LucyNoakes1 memory of #WW1 cast large shadow on eve of #WW2 but entangled with understanding that experience of second war would be very different. Particularly regarding air warfare





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#hiddenWW2 @LucyNoakes1 dominant narratives in GB of #WW2 as 'people's war', envoking Blitz spirit, 'keep calm and carry on', focus on stoicism leaves little room for remembering civilian dead of war.





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#hiddenWW2 @LucyNoakes1 'Burial Civilians Committee' began to plan what would happen to civilian dead in next war from mid-1930s onwards. Large number of casualties expected esp in first few weeks of war. Need to dispose of large numbers of bodies quickly and en mass.





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#hiddenWW2 @LucyNoakes1 but need to avoid conotations of 'pauper's grave'. Need to give civilians killed in warfare the same reverence and respect associated with military internments. Met with mixed success.





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#hiddenWW2 @LucyNoakes1 Coventry as an example of success. Funerals of civilian dead in Nov 1940 did not undermine community morale - as feared - but united community through carefully choreographed funerals. Reassuring to families that dead being treated with respect.





#hiddenWW2 @LucyNoakes1 dead of Coventry died as civilians but buried as soldiers contributing to fight against Nazi brutality. Civilian death was politicised and made 'worthwhile'.





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#hiddenWW2 @LucyNoakes1 However, other civilian burials after air raids failed to mobilise a sense of community unity and reverential stability. Example in Wembley in Dec 1940 which highlighted the low value placed by the state on civilians in death through charging for burials.





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#hiddenWW2 @LucyNoakes1 Some burials of civilian dead in #WW2 did not have reverence and respect shown to soldier dead. In Poplar, October 1940 the civilian dead of air raid 'were given only a lorry for hearse' despite 'dying in service of their country'

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
#hiddenWW2 @LucyNoakes1 Example in Clydebank, March 1941. Local mortuary services overwhelmed. Chaos and confusion at temporary mortuary. Mass burial only practicable method. Funeral not widely covered in press. Insufficient lorries and drivers to transport bodies.





#hiddenWW2 @LucyNoakes1 Sense that state was letting civilian victims of air raids in Clydebank down. Dead disrupted narrative of unity in face of external enemy and continued to do so. Restless disruptive dead of Clydebank compared to Coventry.

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#hiddenWW2 @LucyNoakes1 civilian dead of #WW2 only recently emerging in histories of conflict. 50th anniversaries in 1990s, social media, interest in family history fuelled interest in non-soldier dead & wave of remembrance of civilian dead. Memorials in Exeter, Liverpool, London



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#hiddenWW2 @ein_haus asks about class dimension of 'pauper's burials' of #WW2 civilian dead. Who was organising them and what directions were given about managing them?





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#hiddenWW2 @LucyNoakes1 in theory managed from Whitehall but much more chaotic on the ground. Class stratification of burials reflects the places that were bombed.





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#hiddenWW2 @wugolini asks about Liverpool experience of Blitz. Has memorial in city centre 'cleaned up' image of death?





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#hiddenWW2 James Wallis of @Reflections1418 asks about practices of commemoration and geography. To what degree is burial practice framed by accessibility of site of funeral.





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#hiddenWW2 @daniel_todman asks about difference between local and national memory. Are there places where civilian death becomes symbolic of a particular local identity (e.g. East London) and other deaths are marginalised in that locality?





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#hiddenWW2 @GheeBowman asks about timescale and stages of death. 1) bloody moment of death 2) burial 3) commemoration and memory. Second stage is not dramatic - it is sombre and sad but not memorialised. Therefore fades very quickly from dominant narratives.





#hiddenWW2 @tgplawson what are churches and other religious bodies saying about civilian death in #WW2? Is it different to what they say about military dead?





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#hiddenWW2 Roy Marom (Haifa) asking about differences in types of burial amongst civilians? How do mass burials differ in appearance/epitaph to individal graves of civilians who died in war? Who looks after civilian graves from #WW2?

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We're continuing apace with panel session 3 on marginalisation and the Holocaust, chaired by Dr Ben Shepherd (Glasgow Caledonian University) and featuring papers by Florian Zabransky (Sussex), Anna Zadora (Strasbourg) and Andy @AR_Pearce (UCL/IoE). #hiddenww2



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Introducing the third panel, Ben Shepherd notes the increasing complexity of research in Holocaust studies. #hiddenww2



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Starting us off is Florian Zabransky, talking about his doctoral research on male Jewish identity and the Holocaust. #hiddenww2





Zabransky: male Jewish sexuality was marginalised during the Holocaust and is also silenced tody in Holocaust studies - male Jewish sexuality portrayed as a threat to the German 'Volksgemeinschaft' in Nazi Germany. #hiddenww2





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Zabransky draws on oral history and court documents, and situates his work in relation to broader work on gender and the Holocaust, such as the work of Zoe Waxman. #hiddenww2



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Zabransky builds on existing scholarship on women and female sexuality during the Holocaust by turning spotlight on male Jewish sexualities. #hiddenww2



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Zabransky: Nuremberg laws designed to police especially male Jewish sexuality (and Jewishgentile relationships) - highlights Nazi obsession with Jewish sexuality. #hiddenww2



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Zabransky touches on sensitive issues raised in oral history interviews of male sexual intercourse and use of brothels in concentration camps as reported by survivors - largely silenced in written accounts. Notes male fears of losing potency due to conditions in camps. #hiddenww2



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Zabransky closes by highlighting the importance of love and the expression of sexual desire as part of survival under extreme conditions, citing survivor testimonials. #hiddenww2

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Zabransky also notes, however, that men's reassertion of their sexuality contributes in turn to reestablishing existing gender hierarchies and serve to further oppress women. #hiddenww2





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Zabransky: often linked to feelings of shame and ambivalence, (male) Jewish sexuality during the Holocaust firmly consigned to the private part of memory. #hiddenww2



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Next paper: Anna Zadora's talk on #Holocaust memory in Belarus. #hiddenww2



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Zadora begins by speaking about links between #WW2 memory and national identity in Belarus, during Soviet period and after. #hiddenww2





Zadora: Soviet unsurprisingly propaganda/history neglect any references to aspects of #WW2 that indict collaboration with Nazis. #hiddenww2





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Zadora references new #WW2 museum in Minsk, which features a cupola referencing the Berlin Reichstag, with a Soviet flag planted on it. #hiddenww2





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Zadora has analysed all state-controlled text books in Belarus, and found only one brief reference to Holocaust as 'the systematic extermination of Jews by the Nazis'. #hiddenww2

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'Scholars have often disengaged from Holocaust Education' in schools, and prefer to criticise from afar, argues @AR_Pearce - no winners in this situation. #hiddenww2





Holocaust education has become the main conduit for Holocaust commemoration, argues @AR_Pearce #hiddenww2





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The more Holocaust education becomes institutionalised and Holocaust commemoration politicised, the less space there is for debate on its aims and purposes. Now less about education, and more about serving present-day concerns, argues @AR_Pearce #hiddenww2



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Well-intentioned educational attempts to make Holocaust a 'usable past', argues @AR_Pearce, may lead to young people's Holocaust awareness becoming unrecognisable as history. #hiddenww2



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Distancing process: Holocaust education constructs self-awareness as people who did not / would not commit such atrocities @AR_Pearce #hiddenww2



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Easily identifiable, black-and-white roles in Holocaust education - victim, perpetrator, by-stander are dangerously oversimplified and decontextualised, says @AR_Pearce #hiddenww2



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Conscious of speaking in generalities about Holocaust education, says @AR_Pearce, but still notes prevalent trends. #hiddenww2





Closing his paper, @AR_Pearce calls for Holocaust education that focuses on historical awareness and analysis as well as generalised skill building. #hiddenWW2





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Ben Shepherd summarises 'Marginalisation and the Holocaust' panel, thinking about the importance of why & how aspects of Holocaust are marginalised & what caused this marginalisation in the first place, be it feelings of shame, national or personal identity building. #hiddenww2





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What do we mean by marginalised, queries @tgplawson - is the solution to be challenging dominant narratives, or the power structures underlying them? Is it enough to tell marginal stories, or is more required? #hiddenWW2





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In response, @GheeBowman proposes looking at the centre, the 'chalkface of the school' that shapes public memory - points to shift in British curriculum in 1970s, at which point Holocaust begins to feature prominently after earlier neglect. Not an accidental process. #hiddenWW2



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Regarding @AR_Pearce's point about 'unfashionability' of historical knowledge, @PaulKiem asks how this point and links between history, memory and commemoration could be illustrated w/ concrete examples in Holocaust education. #hiddenWW2





In response to @PaulKiem's question, @AR_Pearce points to Michael Gove's now notorious declaration that we don't need experts any more as symptomatic of a wider public & political mood that is also reflected in the de-historicisation of Holocaust education. #hiddenWW2





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Zadora and @AR_Pearce: more critical, nuanced teaching and increased knowledge can help challengeestablished narratives, both in Belarus and in Britain (in response to earlier point made by @tgplawson)



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There needs to be an actual will, an appetite to engage with the uncomfortable aspects of the Holocaust (and #WW2 more generally), argues @AR_Pearce - many people are likely to be happy with the comforting 'Ladybird version' of the Holocaust in particular. #hiddenWW2



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Roy Marom draws on experience of Israeli Holocaust commemorative culture to argue that all treatment/commemoration of the Holocaust is inevitably characterised by the act of looking back from the present - this arguably makes it hard to avoid its instrumentalisation. #hiddenww2



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Ben Shepherd closing panel 3, reflecting on broader question of how & why Holocaust as a whole is taught. Notes fallacy of distinguishing between 'Nazis' & 'ordinary Germans' & importance of linking Holocaust education to other (and more recent) instances of genocide. #hiddenww2

Hawkins: Challenge of presenting complex narratives to audience in museum setting. Only have very limited number of words to convey information via exhibition text. #hiddenWW2





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Hawkins: Whistlestop slide show through some of the fascinating objects related to China's #WW2 experience in @I_W_M collection. Including Cecil Beaton's photographs of rural China. But limited by what they don't depict e.g. China's war with Japan. #hiddenWW2

Aware of sensitivity of interpretating events significant to China/Chinese by a British museum/curation team #hiddenWW2





Hawkins: Start from point where visitors are familiar (e.g. air raids on Britain) and highlight how similar experiences took place in other parts of the world e.g. air attacks by Japan on Chinese cities #hiddenWW2





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And now Manchester's Frances Houghton on 'Putting History and Memory on Trial: Re-fighting Convoy PQ17 in the High Court, 1970' #hiddenWW2

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Houghton: 30 years before the Lipstadt trial, David Irving was in British courts in a libel case resulting from Irving's publication of 'The Destruction of Convoy PQ17' (1968). Courts found in favour of naval commander of convoy, Captain Jack Broome #hiddenWW2



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Houghton: research examines the reaction amongst ex-wartime naval veterans to both publication and subsequent libel trial. Irving's denigration of 'one of their own' perceived as part of a wider attack on navy and Britain's glorious 'good war' discourse #hiddenWW2





Houghton: Broome never officially held responsible for disaster of convoy PQ17. Retired with all honours intact. However, Irving accused him of only looking after his own safety and that of navy, rather than merchant sailors #hiddenWW2





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Houghton: PQ17 itself is a marginalised history. Very little known about the naval personnel involved and how they responded. More information available on Merchant Navy as part of forgotten voices projets #hiddenWW2





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Houghton: Naval veterans weaponised trial to counter what they perceived as a post-war generation denigrating the sacrifices of their elders. For them, Irving was symbolic of all that was 'wrong' with youth in the 1960s exploiting a wartime tragedy for monetary gain #hiddenWW2





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Houghton: As we embark on forthcoming commemorative period of #WW2 need to consider how, as historians, we write history when our subjects may interpret the narrative differently. How can we navigate any potential pitfalls? #hiddenWW2



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And now our final speaker, the eminent Tim Cook from the Canadian War Museum talking about 'Fighting for Recognition: The Official Apology Campaign of Japanese-Canadians' #hiddenWW2





Cook: Canadian war effort in #WW2 overshadows all previous war experience. Widespread fear on home front of a Japanese invasion aided by 5th columnists (Japanese-Canadians). Although fears unfounded, 22,000 Japanese-Canadians condemned #hiddenWW2



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Cook: White Canadians unable to separate race from citizenship despite vast majority of Japanese-Canadians being naturalised. Followed American example in how to deal with the perceived 'enemy aliens'. Forcibly removed & sent to labour camps in deplorable conditions #hiddenWW2



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Cook: Property and belongings sold off in 'fire sale'. Agonising accounts of internees writing to state to ask what happened to their valued possessions and asking if they could buy them back. Not widely known or publicised but meticulous records kept of these sales #hiddenWW2



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Cook: Memory surpressed by many internees owing to shame of being assumed to be disloyal. But by late 1970s, next generation of Japanese-Canadians start to ask what happened. Begin to uncover this history and are deeply disturbed by it. Begin to seek justice. #hiddenWW2



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Cook: Early 1980s, history of Japanese-Canadians begins to be made visible. Pressure put on govt headed by Trudeau (senior). Redress campaign developing in context of Charter campaigns #hiddenWW2





Cook: 1988: compensation package announced, formal apology made (month after American president made similar gestures). But the most important issue was reclaiming marginalised narrative and gaining recognition #hiddenWW2





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Cook: Historians becoming more like activists - work being used as part of something larger. A fight for social justice #hiddenWW2



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Cook: What is fascinating is how quickly the experience of Japanese-Canadians in #WW2 has now become part of the dominant narrative and widely known in public sphere (memorials, novels, textbooks) #hiddenWW2



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Cook: Japanese-Canadian internment story has moved from the periphery to the centre. Why? An event that has become a symbol of state oppression in time of war. This matters to contemporary Canadians. Tells us something of how we use the unsettled past in the present #hiddenWW2

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@SuzanneBardget1 looking forward @I_W_M reorganising Holocaust exhibition as well as revamp of #WW2 galleries. Reopen in 2020. The #WW2 exhibition will reposition British involvement in war in more global context #hiddenWW2



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@SuzanneBardget1 challenge of distilling a lot of information into a small space. Curation team have reflected seriously on concerns raised about lack of colonial voice in #WW1 galleries and want to 'do better' in #WW2 gallery revamp #hiddenWW2



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@SuzanneBardget1 when history is hidden, highly developed skills are required to find things out. Curators and academic researchers have really important job to do. Need to communicate that quest to broader audiences #hiddenWW2



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@historyworkstv asks @SuzanneBardget1 to what extent, as society changes, does the way it exhibits its history in museums change? As society becomes more comfortable with controversial issues, does that open up the space to display them to general public? #hiddenWW2





@LucyNoakes1 reflecting back on #WW1: struck by ongoing emotional resonance of war amongst general public. As well as appetite to be involved in war's commemoration. Understands David Cameron's comment about war mattering in 'our heads and our hearts'

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@LucyNoakes1 used @MassObsArchive in Nov 2014 to ask public what they associate with #WW1. Words such as futile, destruction, pride, stupidity, jingoism, murder....Would it have shifted by 2018? Probably not. Highlights ongoing emotional resonance of #WW1





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@LucyNoakes1 struck by the potential of centenary community projects to have positive social impact. Can #WW2 anniversaries do the same? Rather than produce memorials (lumps of stone) instead create living memorial and use it to improve lives of those alive today #hiddenWW2



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Attar @BBCHistoryMag asks 'what are marginal histories'? Racial, gendered element certainly. But also certain fronts are prioritised over others. Reader recently complained about lack of coverage of Salonica front. Also economic history doesn't receive much coverage.





Attar: but has popular book publishing during centenary been as groundbreaking as TV/radio production? Have marginal histories penetrated popular book market? Has doubts. Are publishers not brave enough to publish them? Or is it a lack of appetite amongst readership?



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Attar: again there is important commercial element. Magazines, publishers, broadcasters have to be commerically viable. If there is no appetite, then it is too much of a gamble. In turn, have to hit the spots that their readership/audience expect.



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Attar: strong opinion amongst @HistoryExtra readership that #WW1 was futile and Britain should not have been involved. Not worth the cost.



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@MadiganEdward we would be hard pushed to think of another event in British history that has same emotional resonance as #WW1. Particularly evident through his work with @CWGC



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Audience member asks about impact of politics of Brexit on commemorative activity particularly as we approach #WW2 anniversaries

Audience member says these stories (eg Caribbean contribution in WW1) aren't *hidden*, they were taken away for a purpose. @teachlearnwar





Audience member - what is hidden history? Is it hidden or has it been taken away from public visibility for a reason? Have these memories been deliberately put away by community members because of the neglectful way they were/have been treated since the war? #hiddenWW2





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@PaulKiem compares integration of indigenous experience in #WW1 into histories produced in Australia and New Zealand.



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@PaulKiem indigenous experience in #WW1 is being filtered into school education in Australia. Fresh historical research into indigenous service in #WW1 is available to wider audience immediately. Colour of Australian memory has definitely shifted as a result of 'history wars'



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@PaulKiem notes how indigenous people want to be involved in Anzac Day in Australia but don't want to be involved in Australia Day (for obvious reasons). Anzac history has been used to promote an inclusive agenda in Australian society.



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@PaulKiem looking forward how can we be genuinely inclusive so that we don't need 'separate' lessons on womens' experience, indigenous experience of #WW1 before moving on to the 'mainstream' having ticked that diversity box?





@PaulKiem anniversaries of #WW2 in 2039 in Australia will be interesting. How will historical record of Japanese invasion of Australia sit with multicultural make up of Australian society?





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Das: if we want an authentically multicultural society don't we need to work through difficult and uncomfortable histories rather than relying on what could be interpreted as superficial initatives such as poppy hijab?



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Das: emotional engagement can be highly intelligent. Not necessarily sentimental. For #WW2 anniversaries, there needs to be critical space but without letting go of emotional intensity.



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Young: interesting to look back at TV hours dedicated by BBC to #WW1 (excluding live broadcasts). 2014 = 45 hours solely on #WW1. Bulk of activity took place in first year of centenary. Anniversaries that run for many years - how do you maintain public engagement?



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Young: Also how do you maintain organisational engagement?



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Young: Out of those 45 hours, at least 6 or 7 hours were dedicated to what he would describe as 'hidden histories' of #WW1





Young: now in final year of centenary - commissioned around 7-8 hours of factual programming. Will be additional live broadcasting. Energy of interest in 2014 generated the production of alternative histories. Can that energy be maintained and replicated for #WW2 anniversaries?





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Young: job of TV history commissioner means you are in perpetual commemorative mode. On 'constant anniversary alert'! Has to be strict about what is taken on, just because it is an anniversary.



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Young: recognise there is already a lot of #WW2 programming. A cluttered landscape. Need to ensure there is space as anniversaries of #WW2 approach so audience recognise that it IS an anniversary!



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Young: BBC needs to work much harder on ensuring there is diversity in who is telling the history in these programmes. Dominance of white male presenters/historians fronting programmes needs to improve for #WW2 anniversaries and history programming full stop.



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Young: TV needs to continually evolve in the way it tells stories. Need to keep being innovative, creative etc. Through those creative production methods lesser known stories are often found.





Young: as a TV producer, nothing tells you that you're doing your job well than the fact that your material is making you uncomfortable. Imperative to integrate hidden histories and stories that are less palatable.





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Das asks Young: why has there been a lack of focus on sexuality and pacifism in BBC coverage of #WW1?



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Young: acknowledges that there should have been a better way of ensuring crossover between programme seasons e.g. #WW1 programmes and recent 'Gay Britain' programming. A lesson to learn for future anniversary programming.



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@LucyNoakes1 is a better way of defining 'hidden histories' by acknowledging the role of power? That histories are not hidden necessarily, but have not been given access to the mainstream because of power structures.



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@LucyNoakes1 stories of people who have less access to power rather than 'hidden histories'.



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Audience member: think about audience. Who is going to watch this programme? Who is going to read this magazine? If certain community groups don't feel represented by mainstream media, they are not going to watch/read/purchase. How do you persuade them otherwise?





Attar @HistoryExtra knows that readership does not reflect entire society - predominately white, affulent. But magazine should still be telling unfamiliar stories to these audiences e.g. Black/Asian histories. Editorial team is heavily female and this does have positive impact.





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Das ask Attar: surely the merit is in the storytelling? Lesser known histories will get told if they are told in very compelling, creative, engaging manner.



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@GheeBowman who is the us/we? Who has ownership over storytelling? We need to transcend communalism in storytelling. Find the stories we can tell well, tell them, and tell them for everyone. Need to cut across borders and territorialism.



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Audience question: how far can idea of legacy and integration that has formed policy making during centenary be sustained in post-Brexit climate?

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@SuzanneBardget1 UK public engagement environment is framed by organisations like @ahrcpress as well as requirements of REF and impact agenda. There is a strong will amongst academics to share their research in UK.



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@LucyNoakes1 government in UK links research funding, impact and chances of promotion! If that was emulated in Canada, far more Canadian academics would start engaging with the public.





@LucyNoakes1 if dead of war were more central to the memory of #WW2 it would destabilise the 'good war' narratives that are gaining more prominence in Brexit era.





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Das: We need to be very aware of the potential infusion of anti-European political sentiment into commemoration of #WW2
